The program includes the following:

- July 22: Fiber Arts with Rhonda Junkins of Echo Valley Farm in Cornish. Meet the sheep, clean, card and spin the wool, dye the wool with natural pigment, weave the wool.
- July 23: Hand sewing and machine sewing, cooking, baking (Irish Soda Bread with raisins), and pickling (sauerkraut & bread & butter pickles you take home in

Mason jars) in our **Victorian Kitchen**. Make a flute and learn a ditty.

- July 24: Make a figure from clay and cast it in pewter using metal casting/foundry techniques. Make cyanotypes (an early photography technique) with artist Ann Thompson.

Independence Week Celebration Set for July 3-6


The Second Regiment of York Militia will set up for a four-day Independence Week Celebration at Newfield on July 3-6. Learn about colonial military life, weaponry, and much more. There will be an ongoing demonstration of shaving horse construction on Saturday and Sunday particularly the practice of riving, a primitive timber splitting process of constructing furniture. See a shaving horse, draw knife, froe and hatchet used in the construction of this useful woodworking tool that dates from medieval times well into the early twentieth century. This was a tool used by coopers, wheelwrights, cabinet makers, furniture makers and others. Also,

there will be outdoor cooking and costumed interpreters. Visit our letterpress office, our kitchen, and get a ride on a carousel horse. There will be colonial era games to play for kids and parents alike.




Civil War Weekend Set for July 19-21

Don't miss this! On Saturday and Sunday, July 20 and 21 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., we will have the Maine 6th Battery, a Civil War re-enacting group, will present a Civil War encampment as well as demonstrations of parrot rifle cannon firing each

hour on Saturday and Sunday. There will be a mustering in of participating children, marching with wooden rifles, secret decoder wheel making, coded telegraph message sending at our telegraph rooms, a medical triage for bandaging battle wounds (role playing), Enfield rifle firing demo, lead bullet making demo, and blacksmithing, letterpress printing, as well as outdoor cooking with costumed interpreters. (A Bus Tour Guide to Time Travel)

History

- The properties that comprise this museum village were once part of the main commercial area of Newfield village which was devastated by fire in 1947.
- The Durgin House and Trafton House survived the fire due to a change in wind.
- The Newfield bandstand is a replica of the razed 1878 structure that was originally situated off Route 11 at the beginning of Elm Street.
- The museum properties were purchased by Donald King of Topsfield, MA in the 1960s and transformed into a museum village with new constructions.
- Many of the artifacts you see were purchased within 50 miles or less of the museum between 1967 and 1970. They were restored at the museum by staff.
- The Victorian theme museum named Willowbrook at Newfield opened in 1970 and served more than 500,000 visitors during it's 47 seasons under the Willowbrook name.





It's 50th Season

- In 2016, the museum properties and much of the collection of 19th Century Willowbrook Village was gifted to The Curran Homestead.
- The gift triggered a change of name and mission for the 501 (c)(3) nonprofit founded in 1991.
- In 2017, a full-time director/curator was hired to run 19th Century Curran Villages.
- In Orrington, development of a greater infrastructure to share the amazing collections and programming found at Newfield is underway.
- It is hoped that the Orrington village can one day offer school field trips modeled after the hands-on, educational programming that serves more than 1,800 school visitors from York, Cumberland and Oxford c counties in Maine and New Hampshire each season at Newfield.
- The Newfield village offers year-round programming for families each year.
- Five of the museum structures are on the National Register of Historic Places.






