

We Have More Hands-On Programming

The purpose of all the work we have been doing is to fulfill our mission of offering a "Village" that serves as an open-air classroom with multiple spaces for sharing lessons of science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics (STEAM) with our working collection. Our focus is hands-on experiential learning. What is unique is that we offer actual learning experiences in an era in which the virtual has become an everincreasing source of what we know and how we know it, so we offer experiences with traditions of the past that are rarely available today but nonetheless are important to nurturing critical thinking, problem solving and strategic planning skills for the challenges of the 21st century. We offer an ever-increasing number of opportunities for hands-on learning that are especially empowering promoting independence, self-

awareness, and intellectual discovery.

We are currently seeking funding through grants and through ongoing private donations like your own to further develop our summer S.T.E.A.M. History Day Camp in July 2023, create a post and beam pavilion structure to house a pottery kiln for that offering and many to follow, as well as complete an post and beam structure for further arts programming. Initially, we plan ongoing pottery and metal casting this year with other arts offerings to follow. The planned structures will additionally serve as public learning opportunities through multiple offerings of post and beam workshop instruction in their construction. Our Carpenter Shop was similarly produced and has become one of our most important centers for hands-on learning activities.

Funding is also sought to assist us in

meeting the cost of individual instructors for our 2023 summer camps and costumed interpreters/facilitators for this scheduled 2023 spring and fall school field trip season. Our summer instructors often travel distances within Maine to share their knowledge and to provide unique learning experiences. Field trip interpreters are seasonal contributors usually from nearby locations. Among all these contributors some depend on compensation.

Funding is sought to meet the cost of building materials and timber framing workshop instruction. This instructor will serve as master builder and lead students creating a mortise and tenon post and beam framework for a 16' x 36' roofed woodburning pottery kiln pavilion and a 20' x 41' Arts Barn. Future programming in the



latter will include initially pottery and metal casting and expand to other arts activities. It will be built on a concrete slab we have prepared. A professional grade metal casting furnace donated by **Richard Tessier** will also be featured; it will be set up under an open lean-to roof construction off the back of the Art Barn on a porous gravel pad.

The Art Barn structure will be completed.

The Art Barn structure will be completed, including sheathing and roofing, by the

museum's part-time staff and volunteers. Volunteers are essential to a museum like our own as we are a grass roots nonprofit. We have done nearly everything you can see at the Museum without contractors, and much has been done by volunteers. We Need Many Volunteers!

Volunteers could serve most of our human resources needs but there are decreasingly fewer individuals that can devote the time that the museum so desperately needs given their own jobs and responsibilities. Certainly, paid instructors are in addition to a sometimes-equal number who volunteer time to our programming; we need new volunteers to train as costumed school field trip interpreters as well as assist us in our upcoming summer programming. A costumed interpreter will inhabit one of our theme buildings and facilitate hands-on learning through familiarity with a selection of artifacts from our working collection and knowledge of the time period.

Be a Costumed Interpreter!


A costumed interpreter will be responsible for not only learning the details of an interpretative guide, which includes information about pertinent artifacts and their connection to an historical timeline) but also details about the buildings, trades, and occupations presented at our rural 19th century village. As you may know, volunteer Richard Lizotte of Orrington brought the Museum's steam traction engine back to life this past summer; it ran at several events under his care. He recently took on a "winter project" carting an antique diesel-powered electric generator we recently acquired back to his home workshop in the hope of making it operable again. If you too have the knowledge to take on a mechanical restoration like this, we have many projects to choose from. Contact us.

Ceramics and Arts Program Taking Shape

There have been unprecedented pledges of volunteerism and expressed interest in assisting us in developing a ceramics program by community members. This resource includes the construction of a pavilion to house a large commercial-grade, woodburning, firebrick kiln recently donated by **Tim and Valerie Walton** with many other materials like kiln furniture, glazes and bagged clay that are being relocated to the museum.

Partial funding is needed to assist in the disassembly, relocation, and reassembly of this donated pottery kiln. Funding will also assist in building materials and labor for the pavilion structure to house the kiln and the additional barn structure, the **Art Barn**, to serve as a ceramics and arts workshop space where worktables, potter's wheels, tools, equipment, and storage for related supplies will reside.

Previous steps towards offering a ceramics program include our installation of an electric kiln in a newly constructed utility shed last year and receipt of two potter's wheels and ceramic slip molds as donations. As a ceramics reference resource, the Museum has an extensive collection of historical Maine-made stoneware and redware examples from the 19th and early 20th century by several known potteries; Orrington had its' own Brooks Pottery in the 19th century that produced ceramic tile, porcelain pipes, and on occasion redware and stoneware pottery. All these acquisitions have led to our most recent acceptance of the donated firebrick kiln originating from the now defunct Antiquity Tile Company of Hampden. The kiln is a mortar-less firebrick construction with a steel frame exoskeleton that holds it together.



Wish List: We're still looking for donations of pottery wheels; we will soon offer pottery workshops.

Successful Timber Framing Workshop Returns

There will be three one-week timber frame workshops this season. The first will begin with the framework of the 16' x 36' kiln pavilion, which will also serve to house picnic tables for lunching and warm weather programming. The two follow up workshops will focus on creating the 20' x 41' timber frame Art Barn that will be similar in appearance to our Cider & Grain Mill.

This same timber framing workshop scenario was instrumental in the creation of our Carpenter's Shop with partial funding from the Davis Family Foundation and similarly with **Ed Somers**, timber framer and historical structure restorer, as instructor. The building was later completed by volunteers and our part-time work force.

Our first mortise and tenon workshop produced the framework in part for our Carpenter Shop.

Learn to plan, measure, cut and erect a timber frame structure by hands-on experience with a timber framer and historic building restorer. The first day will familiarize you with hand and power tools necessitated. Learn to maintain them. This hands-on project will have you creating mortise and tenon posts, braces, beams, rafters, and fastening them with pegs. You will also install purlins with metal fasteners. Students that complete this 7-day course are welcome to participate in our two additional week-long workshops in August and October for free. Starter tool kit needed. Get your own or buy ours. Lunch provided. Dinner and housing your responsibility. We can provide locations. Free camping and RV parking possible on museum site.

Work Has Resumed on Car Culture Building

We poured a steel reinforced concrete pad in 2021 for the purpose of this 20 x 41 Art Barn. To the left of this slab is our 24' x 80' **Car Culture Building** which is nearly complete, but needs donated funds to finish it; these funds could be an opportunity for naming rights.

The building houses both a collection of horse drawn carriages, sleds, and sleighs as well as Ford Model T cars and a Model TT truck generously donated by Isaac Hughes of Fayetteville, NY, in addition to Ford Model T and Model A homemade tractors using manufactured mail-order conversion kits, a Model T cord saw and several homemade "jitterbug" tractors and log skidder. You may have been to one of our Jitterbug Pulling Competitions in partnership with Maine Antique Tractor Club. We have scheduled a Pull this season on September 9.

The Car Culture Building is overcrowded with collection and completion of a planned and partially funded (Davis Family Foundation Grant) Carriage Barn will eventually relieve it of horse drawn vehicles that have taken up residence. It can then be utilized for the exhibition of solely our antique cars, related artifacts, and important programming like our Ford Model T Assembly Line learning activity for kids that includes five ½ scale Model T assemblages as intended.

The Model T Assembly Line learning activity promotes strategic planning, critical thinking and the development of team building skills. It was inspired by Springvale, Maine's Wentworth Garage's own contracted Model T assembly line set-up back in 1913 to serve distribution of Fords for the Maine market. The activity was unveiled to participating students at the 2019 Maine Science Festival and used for one school field trip season of more than 2000 school visitors in 2019 and at a Boy Scout Klondike Derby Camporee in 2020 at Newfield before it was disassembled and relocated to Orrington. Completion of functioning doors for the Car Culture Building's six bay door openings, which are currently sealed up with temporary materials, is needed. Doors will make the building functional and allow ongoing public access to the building for the first time.



The Car Culture Building needs additional funding to be completed. We hope to get a coat of stain on it this spring.

Naming Rights Available

Naming Rights in association with our **Car Culture Building** identifying signage (i.e. The Car Culture Building, Sponsored by, or Sponsored in Part by...) can be bestowed upon one or more individuals or businesses. A donation of \$25,000 would give exclusive naming rights. Donations of two \$12,500 gifts or four \$6,250 gifts are sought for shared naming rights. The name of the donor(s) would appear on the exterior of the building in 6-inch letters on a permanent hand-painted wood frame sign. The museum to date has invested more than \$30,000 on this 20' x 80' structure that consists of three relocated structures on a steel reinforced concrete slab. This will be a popular destination for kids with the installation of multiple hands-on, interactive learning activities.

Sign Up for Metal Casting Instruction

instruction in bronze, aluminum, and brass since 2010 with the assistance of hobbyist Peter Grant who also provided workshops at Willowbrook Museum since 2013. See the Metal Casting Workshop offering for March. Grant has been instrumental in casting parts for the purpose of our past and soon to return **Antique Engine Repair and Maintenance** Workshops and for Leonard's Mills of Bradley's own Lombard Log Hauler restoration. Grant's contributions have required numerous instances of transporting his equipment to and fro with much set-up and take-down time which have largely been an obstacle to more frequent workshops. An onsite foundry will

insure greater frequency of this offering.

Additionally, this scenario will allow for others to be trained in the art of metal casting for the purpose of the program's future sustainability. Tools and equipment as well as an extensive collection of historic wooden metal casting patterns from the **Drinkwater Foundry** (southern Maine), **Bangor Foundry & Machine Co., Union Iron Works**, and **Hinckley**, **Egery & Company** (Bangor) will be mounted on the planned Art Barn's interior walls with interpretive signage.

We have been working towards the creation of the planned Arts Barn for some time in conjunction with our three-year effort developing a new infrastructure through new constructions and the

relocation, reassembly, and improvement of fourteen theme museum structures from the former Willowbrook Museum in Newfield, Maine. Our work has included unpacking and revival of an extensive repertoire of hands-on learning resources used at Newfield by Willowbrook and later by Curran (2017-2020).

These highly tactile and kinesthetic learning experiences facilitated with functional artifacts from our working collection grew in ever-increasing popularity before Willowbrook closed d due to decades old financial losses and subsequently Curran's consolidation of the gifted resources of Willowbrook with its' own in Orrington.

Growing School Visitation

From 2013-2019, school field trip visitors grew in Newfield from less than a thousand to 2500-3000 visitors largely due to new grant-funded programming emphasizing hands-on learning experiences and the offer of a carousel ride to all. We have worked at picking up where we left off in Newfield having offered free field trips initially in 2022 to 150 public, private and homeschool visitors; this year we hope to grow that number by offering more of the former programming.

In addition, new fundraising strategies directed to subsidizing the price of admission for school field trips by individual, organizational, and business sponsors is promising to increasing visitation.

In addition to growing school visitation, we have already surpassed the number of weekday and weekend workshops offerings for kids and adults from that of Willowbrook between 2013-2016 as well as 2017-2020 when Curran ran that museum under its' own name. Last year, Curran

started offering year-round programming like never before. Last year, we had more than a dozen fall and winter workshops for children and adults, including "school group workshops", a new phenomenon, with offerings of blacksmithing to Ellsworth High School students and crystal radio set building for Misty Simoneau's class at Temple Christian Academy of Waterville. We are making efforts to further develop and promote these programs for the post-COVID era. Contact us for information.



BLACKSMITHING: MAKE A KNIFE

Cost: \$295

This is our popular two-day class that begins with forging a blade and tang from 1095 steel in a propane burning forge. File, grind, and sand before annealing your blade with a peanut oil quench. The blade will be oven tempered overnight. Prepare your tang on Day 2 for a handle. Fit brass rivets with hardwood scales. Epoxy wood to steel. Do a final sanding and finish with an oil rub. Bring a 2.5 pein, drilling or engineer type hammer, safety eyewear with side shields, natural fiber gloves, clothing and footwear, and earplugs (optional).



Cost: \$325

This kit prepared by us includes a repurposed helium tank with welded horseshoe legs and other features. You will do the assembly including a fire wand with

brass fittings and copper line that you cut and flair. You will create steel reinforcement and a mold to pour high temp refractory cement to line the interior of the tank using a fitted sana tube. This takes all of the 6 ½ hours allotted. Bring lunch. A portable forge with a 30 PSI regulator is the result. The cement needs a few days to cure and you're ready with a little ventilation to knife make and do other blacksmithing.

You work with real lead and wood type as well as our collection of wingdings, borders, ornaments, and cuts. This has artistic as well as industrial applications; cast a piece of machinery or a figurative sculpture. We have cast parts to early gas engines: bronze rocker arms, aluminum mufflers, and bronze governor weights as well as sundials, door knockers, and art objects.

These will be made from synthetic feed bags adorned with graphics and a variety of colors, which makes you wonder whether they're made that way so that they will be recycled into something else like the printed patterns on cotton flour, burlap seed, or muslin sugar bags of yore that were made into dresses and all else! We'll show you our collection.

BLACKSMITHING: MAKE A DRAW KNIFE & CROOKED KNIFE

Cost: \$295

Over two days, you will experience coal fire or propane forge blade-smithing. Create a two handled draw knife with a tempered edge for shaping wood held in a vise or shaving horse. Make a crooked knife, a traditional knife form with a hooked edge point used for shaping wood, preparing hides or canoe making. The handle will be a traditional crooked shape piece that holds the blade in a notch and is wrapped with sinew or cord.

This involves measuring, drilling, fastening screws, cutting with a handsaw, using a bit and brace, and sanding.






CRYSTAL RADIO SET BUILDING

Cost: \$55

Make a working AM radio. Begin with a wooden base and fasten components with screws on as well as well as attach components through soldering (We'll teach you). This was the first radio receiver. It uses the power of the received radio signals to produce audible sound needing no external power. We may add a tiny amplifier to this build for the first time in order to boost the sound output. The quartz crystal functions as a detector rectifying the alternating current radio signal to a pulsing direct current. This is a memorable learning experience especially when you pick up a radio signal on the radio you just built!


